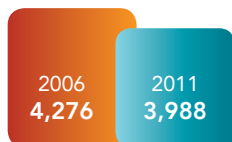

FIGURE 5 ONTARIO EMPLOYMENT RATE - 2000-13

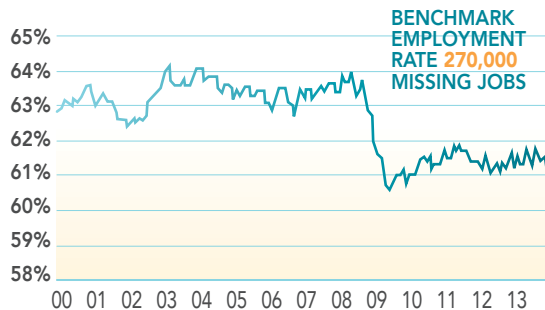
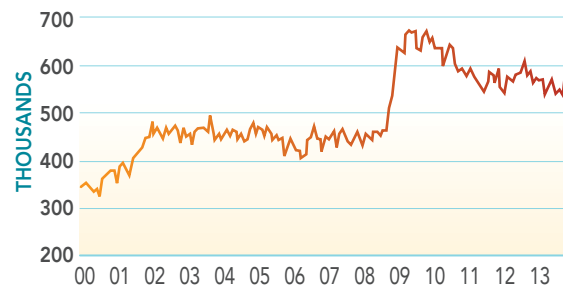


FIGURE 6 ONTARIO UNEMPLOYMENT RATE - 2000-13

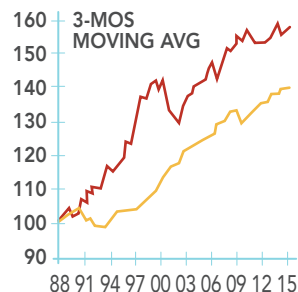

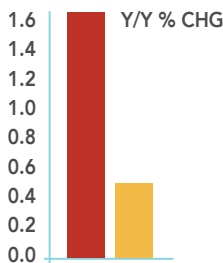

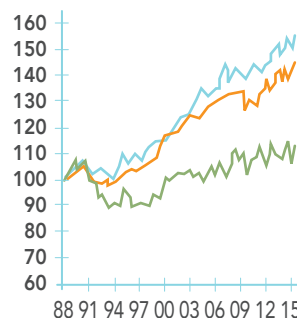
● SELF-EMPLOYED

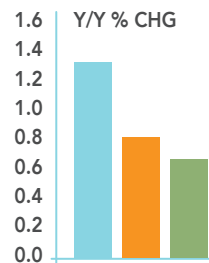
Slow Growth in Number of Full-Time High-Paying Jobs

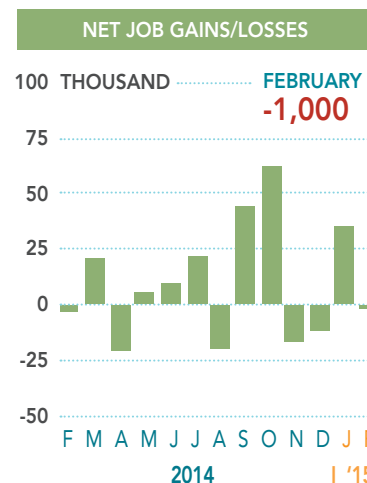
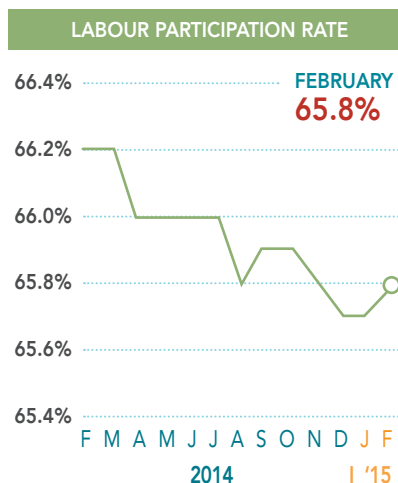
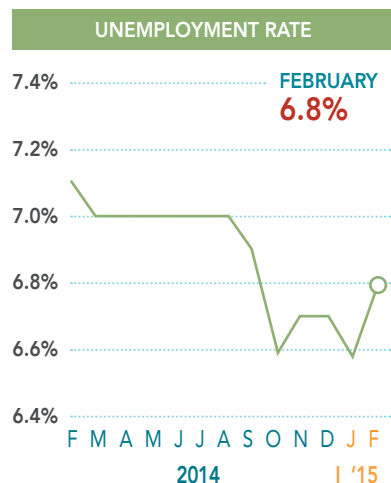


● LOW-PAYING INDUSTRIES
